## SPRING FAYRE





# PARISH COUNCIL REPORT



At the meeting held on 4<sup>th</sup> January it was noted that there had been 2 instances of **fly tipping** some way up the bridleway north of the Village beside the chicane. Several drums of vegetable oil had been dumped and the incidents had been reported to the County Council. With the agreement of the landowner, Ian Thompson had fitted a padlock to the gate beside the B1337 to prevent further illegal access.

Problems with parking on pavements at the north end of the Village and speeding traffic were also reported. Residents are encouraged to take photographs and make a report to the police if any vehicle is parked so as to force pedestrians to walk into the road. A meeting will be arranged with the Community Police Officer, NCC highway officials and our local County Councillor to review the situation.

Development issues around Longhirst Hall / Micklewood Close / Dairy Lane were discussed at some length. All residents were anxious to see the wooden gate allowing pedestrian access to the rear of Longhirst Hall reopened and the Parish Council was awaiting news from NCC following the meeting held at County Hall with planning officials and representatives from Micklewood Close. It was also noted that apparent changes in the board of Dere Street Homes might offer an opportunity to foster a more positive relationship with the Company. Peter Coates was asked to contact County Councillor David Towns to try and find out what progress NCC planners had made.

It was agreed that the ongoing work of the **Parish Litter Pickers** should be recognised. They have cleared litter from the verges of the four main roads into the Village on a monthly basis for 15 years and their efforts are very much appreciated by everyone. A short presentation will be made at the coffee morning to be held in the Village Hall on **Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> February**.

Representatives from the **major Parish organisations** will be invited to attend a meeting to review how we work together to the benefit of all Parish residents. This will include the Parish Council, the Parish Association, the Parochial Church Council, the Garden Association and the Longhirst Leader. Representatives from Micklewood Close will also be invited.

The Broadband Working Party is currently trying to ascertain the progress (or lack of progress) Openreach are making to connect the Ashington exchange numbers to fibre broadband. Any news will be reported to residents as soon as possible.

The Parish Council is keen to involve residents and discuss issues that are concerning them as much as possible. At the same time the Council wishes to ensure that business is conducted efficiently and that meetings do not drag out unnecessarily. Any resident wishing to have an issue raised at the next meeting is requested to contact the Clerk [Ian Thompson (a)] with a brief written summary of the item at least 7 days beforehand.

The next meeting will be held at 7pm on Thursday 1st March in the Village Hall and all residents are invited to attend.

# VILLAGE HALL NEWS



It is with much regret that we have to report the decision of our Chairman, Gill Featonby, to resign from the Board. She has been Chairman of the Parish Association since it was set up in 2001, overseeing the demanding and complicated processes of achieving charitable status,

negotiating the 99 year lease, raising the substantial funds needed for refurbishment, the management of the refurbishment itself and the development of the Hall as a resource for the Village and wider community during the past ten years. We will be forever grateful for her tireless contributions, and those of her late husband David, to the Village Hall and the community of

Longhirst and we wish her well as she undertakes her move to Morpeth. Ian Thompson is going to step in as Chairman for the time being.

The other big issue for the Village Hall is the decision of the Board of Trustees, to apply for a 'Premises Licence' for the supply of alcohol and the staging of regulated entertainment under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003 between the hours of 9am and 12.30am at night. The application will be submitted to the licencing authority on the 1<sup>st</sup> February this year in the hope that the licence will commence from the 1<sup>st</sup> of April.

It is not the intention of the Trustees to increase the number of occasions when alcohol is supplied or regulated entertainment is put on. A 'Premises Licence' simplifies the current process and reduces the cost of enabling the users of the Village Hall to have a drink or put on a play or film without the need to apply to the County Council for a Temporary Event Notice every time.

Once the application has been submitted, details can be viewed Monday to Friday, 9am to 4pm at The Licencing Section, Northumberland County Council, Fire & Rescue Service, Business Compliance & Public Protection Unit, Stakeford Depot, East View, Stakeford, NE62 5TR and any formal comments or objections you may wish to make about the application must be in writing and sent to that address on or before the 2<sup>nd</sup> March 2018.

If you would like to know more about why the Parish Association has decided to apply for the 'Premises Licence' and the implications for the Village Hall, please feel free to contact our new Chairman, Ian Thompson (a) who will be happy to call round and discuss the matter.

## VICAR'S LETTER



Before Christmas Year 4 from Pegswood School visited St. John's Church and spent a morning asking questions and identifying features which they expected to find in a parish church. The children were particularly intrigued by the organ, one enthusiastic young lad discovered there were 1,216 pages in an old bible which was too big and heavy for him to carry while several others enjoyed putting the sign of the cross on their foreheads with water from the baptismal font. One youngster thought the font might

be a bird bath. Questions were also asked about features particular to St. John's like the carved reredos behind the altar depicting the resurrection of Christ and the stained glass windows dedicated to local saints. Of some interest were the Churchwardens' staves which Dorothy McMillan showed them. Rev'ds Lee and John got dressed up and put on coloured stoles leading into a discussion of the church's four seasonal colours: white for celebration (Christmas and Easter); purple for waiting and preparing as in Advent (preparing for Christmas) and Lent (preparing for Easter); red for Good Friday (the blood of Christ) and finally green for so called "Ordinary Time". On their way out of church the class particularly enjoyed the story of the weathercock which once surmounted the spire and how it came to sustain bullet holes during World War One. Walking around the outside of the Church we noted the gravestones but the class was disappointed about the total absence of gargoyles on the walls. After receiving a blessing, they walked back up the road to Pegswood.

Their class teacher Mrs Welsh very kindly sent us some of their work which was displayed on the church noticeboard. This is a collection of some observations made by Abbey, Hareem and Katie put together to spell out Longhirst.

n the top of the church there used to be an old cockerel.

Good Friday is when Jesus got sadly crucified on the cross.

Hanging from the wooden roof was a colourful rope you pull it for the bell to ring.

 $\mathfrak{J}$ nside the church there is a gold and shiny lectern that holds the bible.

Red pretty stoles represented Jesus' blood, special scarves are called stoles.

**₷**oldiers targeted the weathervane it has 3 holes in it.

The church has a musical organ for hymns.
