

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT



The meeting held on 13th September was attended by an NCC Highways Officer, Richard McKenzie, and a wide range of **highway issues** was discussed including traffic speeds, new speed signs, parking and Parish priorities for the NCC Local Transport Plan. New electronic speed

monitoring signs will be ordered as soon as the finance has been agreed with David Towns (our County Councillor) and the old sign beside the Village Hall will be removed (done by NCC within 48 hours). It was agreed that the priorities are improvements to the footpaths along the Pegswood Road, along Station Road from the Village to the level crossing and the B1337 from Fawdon to the Hebron junction. NCC will arrange for a Road Safety Officer to survey safety issues through the Village and recommend improvements.

Andrea Teesdale, our Community Police Officer, was also present and promised to request that the speed enforcement van be deployed in Longhirst. She advised that residents should ensure that their sheds are secured at night and to report any suspicious activity by late evening "fish sellers" who seem to be targeting this area at present. Andrea can be contacted on 07766 193262.

The Clerk, Ian Thompson, reported that the **annual audit** had been completed successfully and that recent problems with the TSB are now resolved.

Following consultations with residents a Parish Council notice board will be erected at Micklewood Close. Many thanks to Carol Hunter for her assistance with this.

At the last meeting it was pointed out that many Parish road signs were dirty and/or partially obscured by overhanging branches. It was suggested that this might be an opportunity to extend the highly valued contribution already being made by the Longhirst Litter Pickers and attempt to recruit additional volunteers to clean signs and clear the tops of drains, etc.. It was agreed that such an initiative could well add to a sense of pride in the local community and should be encouraged.

The Council has discussed problems caused by on-street parking at the north end of the Main Street over many years without making any noticeable improvement and it was agreed that attempts should be made to acquire the field at the north west corner of the Village for potential community allotments and car parking. The landowner would be contacted to see if it is possible to purchase the land.

The Woodland Trust have appointed a new manager and contractor to maintain **Paddock Wood** and work is currently underway to cut grass, thin trees, lay hedges and seed wild flowers. They are also considering constructing a pond to encourage other wildlife but would **welcome comments**. Please contact Ian Thompson (a) if you have any suggestions to make.

The **next meeting** will be held in the Village Hall at 7pm on **Thursday 1st November** and all residents are welcome to attend.

MICKLEWOOD MATTERS

The majority of the recently developed properties have now been sold (or are under offer) including four of the five detached houses at the end of Micklewood Close. The apartments are about to be released and hopefully this will be the end of the development within the boundary of Longhirst Hall, but watch this space.

Mr Cowell has undertaken a considerable amount of work dredging and creating ponds, clearing woodland and rhododendrons. This has opened up the ground between the boundary wall and the cricket pitch behind his newly created fence.

In spite of promises to create a path there is still no direct access to the Village leaving residents with the choice of either walking along the narrow pavement at the side of the B1337 (which is not very safe) or cutting through onto Dairy Lane and annoying the local residents. We are hoping the situation will be resolved shortly.

Micklewood residents met on the 19^{th} September and agreed to form a Residents Committee. Hopefully this will move forward some of the issues with Dere Street Homes and Mr Cowell.

On a more positive note, many species have been spotted on and around the pond behind my house including otters, deer, moorhens, ducks, swans, heron and even a trio of cormorants, and as with all visitors some more welcome than others!

VILLAGE HALL NEWS



The Trustees are pleased to report that the whole of the rear car park has now been covered with soil reinforcement mesh so there should be no more problems with cars getting stuck in the wet. The internal redecoration planned for weekends during late October,

OBITUARY

SYLVIA WELBURY: 23rd November 1927 - 18th August 2018

Sylvia was born in Mansfield and was the eldest surviving child of 11. She moved to Guidepost at a young age and then to London for her first job at the Cumberland Hotel which was bombed during the Second World War.

Sylvia's first husband, Thomas, sadly died and she met her second husband, William, at the East Mill Morpeth where they both worked making garments for soldiers. They married in 1954 and began



married life in Pegswood, before moving to Longhirst. They lived in Mansfield from 1966-69 but then returned to Longhirst where Sylvia lived ever since.

She always supported the Village Hall and the Church and when the Carol Singers came around they never had to knock, she'd be there waiting with her donation and would always ask them to sing Silent Night. One of her highlights was to go to the Village Hall for the Luncheon Club. She loved it, mixing with her friends, and as Sylvia would say, "where else can you get a two-course meal and good company for £5?" Even on the Wednesday before she died, she was sat up in her bed with a smile on her face, looking forward to her meal coming from the Luncheon Club. Last year her family organised a surprise 90th birthday party for her in the Village Hall and the large room was filled with relatives and friends from the Village and beyond.

Sylvia would have been delighted to know that £187 was collected for Cancer Research at her thanksgiving service at the Church. She will be sadly missed by her three children Maureen, Lynne and Billy, three grandchildren, one great- grandchild, two great-great-grandchildren and all those who knew her.

VICAR'S LETTER - REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY 2018



Late one Sunday afternoon a week or two back I was about to close up at Bothal Church after the service when two visitors arrived and had a look around. On their way out they said they were especially intrigued by the War Memorial which stands outside the Church by the road. They wanted to know why the dates inscribed on it for the First Word War were 1914-1919 and not 1914-1918. It is the same on our War Memorial in Longhirst Village. As we all know the ceasefire or armistice that

ended hostilities came into effect on the eleventh hour, of the eleventh day, of the eleventh month, 1918 and is why this year the centenary of the ending of the war is being celebrated. So why 1919 and not 1918 on the War Memorials? The best explanation I could offer was that the armistice was one thing but the formal peace treaty which was eventually signed at the famous French palace of Versailles took much longer to work out and was not completed until June 1919. However, it was in November 1918 that Europe breathed a collective sigh of relief that the "Great War" had finally come to an end and naturally enough huge crowds gathered in most European cities that day to celebrate the end of a conflict that had claimed the lives of millions of people both military and civilian.

The visitors' observation about the dates on the War Memorial however made me think more carefully about what is meant by peace. Is peace just a mere absence of open conflict as in the ceasefire of 1918 which we will remember this year? Or does peace demand rather more than that? Is not peace more of a process by which former enemies agree to recognise their differences and attempt to find a path to reconciliation through negotiation with each other? Does it not involve a commitment to create conditions where a common good is possible, where all sides may flourish and peace in the longer term become more likely? Such things take longer to work out, hence the date 1919 stands on the Longhirst and Bothal War Memorials. Next year perhaps might be a more fitting time to reflect on how well the "peacemakers" of 1919 did. This year however as we gather here in Longhirst at the War Memorial just before 11am for our annual Remembrance Sunday vigil and then move on to the Village Hall afterwards for refreshments, we may appreciate the profound thankfulness for the cessation of hostilities by a generation of people who had lived and suffered through the catastrophe that unfolded between 1914 and 1918.

PS. ADVENT SUNDAY TOY SERVICE. Last year we at St. John's won an award from the

Cedarwood Centre in North Shields for our annual gift of Christmas presents for distribution among low income families in the Meadowell area of North Shields. This year our Advent Sunday Toy Service takes place at 10am on **Sunday 2nd December** and we will again be collecting presents for children and teenagers.
